
'The Age Of Stupid' is the new documentary-drama-animation hybrid from Director Franny Armstrong (McLibel, Drowned Out) and Oscar-winning Producer John Battsek (One Day In September, Live Forever, In the Shadow of the Moon).

Oscar-nominated Pete Postlethwaite (In The Name of the Father, Brassed Off, The Usual Suspects) stars as an old man living in the devastated world of 2055. He watches 'archive' footage from 2008 and asks: Why didn't we stop climate change when we had the chance?

Runaway climate change has ravaged the planet by 2055. Pete plays the founder of The Global Archive, a storage facility located in the (now melted) Arctic, preserving all of humanity's achievements in the hope that the planet might one day be habitable again. Or that intelligent life may arrive and make use of all that we've achieved. He pulls together clips of "archive" news and documentary from 1950-2008 to build a message showing what went wrong and why.

Former thief and mobster, Michel Vaujour always chose to break for freedom over a life behind bars, adventure over a life of submission. He has spent 27 years in prison – 17 of those in solitary confinement. He succeeded in carrying out amazing escapes with toy guns worthy of a Hollywood script. The most notorious involved a firearm made out of soap and a daring helicopter break out organized by his wife from the roof of a jail. He was finally released on parole in 2003.

If his life story is at times an exhilarating ride, he also experienced some of the most challenging conditions the penal system can bestow. This isolation forced him to continuously confront himself. The reward has been selfenlightenment.

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Fabienne Godet's film is an uplifting and universal story of a remarkable transformation. Michel Vaujour's greatest escape was not from jail but from himself: the liberation of the mind and ultimately, the soul.



After "We Feed the World", the spectacular documentary about our foodstuffs, the film-maker Erwin Wagenhofer presents us with a new, shocking documentary. "Let's Make MONEY" follows the tracks of our money through the worldwide finance system. Wagenhofer looks behind the scenes of the colourful backdrop of banks and insurance companies. What does our pension provision have to do with the property blow-up in Spain? We don't have to buy a home there in order to be involved. As soon as we open an account, we're part of the world-wide finance market – whether we want to be or not. The bank enters our account into the global money circuit. Possibly banks or pension funds lend our money to speculators. We customers have no idea where our debtor lives and what he does to pay our interest fees. Most of us aren't even interested, because we like to follow the call of the banks: "Let your money work". But this is absurd, money can't work. Only people, animals or machines can work.

As the world is on the brink of a global financial crisis, this timely documentary explores how we are all implicated in the political and economic machinations of the international finance market by simply putting our money in a bank. A shocking and invaluable film that should be required viewing for all. In this current economic climate its importance cannot be underestimated.

There's an awful lot to like about this infectious celebration of a remarkable event featuring some superb, larger-than-life performers at the top of their game. HOLLYWOOD REPORTER

The music festival "Zaire '74" assembled America's biggest rhythm and blues talents – James Brown and the Mighty JBs, Bill Withers, B.B. King, the Spinners – along with top African acts such as Miriam Makeba and Afrisa. The festival was held in 1974 in Kinshasa, in conjunction with the boxing match between Muhammad Ali and George Foreman known as the "Rumble in the Jungle".

Most of the American performers, emboldened by the civil rights movement, were visiting Africa for the first time, exploring their roots and somewhat naive beliefs about the dictator Mobutu Sese Seko. The promoters hired a team of esteemed documentary cameramen to film everything, including street life in Kinshasa and behind-the-scenes footage of the show being assembled. The crew masterfully recorded classic numbers such as Makeba's "The Click Song," King's "The Thrill Is Gone," and of course, Brown's "Soul Power."

Part of that footage was used in 1996 in the Academy-winning documentary film WHEN WE WERE KINGS which focused on the Ali-Foreman fight. SOUL POWER, with its unseen footage, plays like a time capsule, documenting the heady days when the musical crossover between Africa and America was just emerging.

SEX IVIY LIFE a film by Bahman Motamedian



Iran- 2008 - 76 min & 52 min - Color - Farsi

Tells the story of seven Iranian transsexuals living in Tehran who live pieces of their own lives on the screen. Motamedian uses a mix of documentary and fiction to better explore their journey in finding their true identity and manages to avoid the obvious trap of sensational and victimization. What surprises is that getting the acceptance from families proves to be more a challenge than from the religious authorities for a sex change operation. Yet, the reason for such tolerance is that to change sex seems better than to live a homosexual life!

Films open our eyes to some things which we have no access to...Khastegi chronicles and documents the struggles of transsexuals, and in the light of that struggle, comes positive vibes in their courage for independence despite what others might think.

YOUSSOUN NDOUR: I BRING WHAT I LOVE

Senegalese pop sensation Youssou Ndour has spent the last 20 years in the spotlight as a world-renowned musician and the iconic representative "voice of Africa". At the height of his career, Youssou, became frustrated by the negative perception of his Muslim faith and composed Egypt, a deeply spiritual album dedicated to a more tolerant view of Islam.

It was a critical and career-defining moment. Ndour's brave musical message was whole heartedly embraced by Western audiences but ignited serious religious controversy in his homeland of Senegal.

Combining unprecedented images of Senegal's most sacred Muslim rituals, vibrant concert performances filmed around the world and intimate access to Ndour and his family, I Bring What I Love chronicles the difficult journey Youssou must undertake to assume his true calling. Youssou Ndour is a voice of hope and tolerance, a modern day moral and political leader whose message transcends music but remains grounded in the universality of faith.



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Directed, shot and written by Ellen Kuras and co-directed and edited by Thavisouk (Thavi) Phrasavath over the course of 23 years, THE BETRAYAL (NERAKHOON) tells the epic story of a family odyssey from war-torn Laos to the mean streets of New York. Thavi narrates his own story as a child surviving the Vietnam war and then as a young man struggling to overcome the hardships of immigrant life, an experience shared with his mother who tells her own astonishing tale of perseverance as a wife and mother in war. Breathtaking and compelling, renowned cinematographer Ellen Kuras's film is a poetic, deeply personal film, a powerfully eloquent tribute of what it means to be in exile, of the far-reaching consequences of war, and of the resilient bonds of family. Thavisouk's unforgettable journey reminds us of the strength necessary to survive and of the human spirit's inspiring capacity to adapt, rebuild, and forgive.
